

Population Estimates

Alberta's population continued to have the highest year over year growth rate among all provinces. The second quarter of 2009 indicated net inflows of people to Alberta from interprovincial (4,737) and international (6,089) sources, as well as net non-permanent residents (2,594).

As of July 1, 2009, Alberta's population was estimated to be 3,687,662 (Table 1). This count represents a year over year increase of approximately 91,795 persons (2.55%) since July 1, 2008. Although Alberta's population growth rate has slowed since 2007, it presently remains double the national rate of 1.24%.

Population estimates for July 1, 2009 and growth rates (since July 1, 2008) for all provinces and territories are provided in Table 2. Across all provinces, Alberta had the highest growth rate, year over year. British Columbia and Saskatchewan had the next highest growth rates both at 1.63%, followed by Manitoba at 1.32%.

Migration

In the second quarter of 2009, Alberta had the largest interprovincial migration gain in Canada (Table 3). The province gained 4,737 people in interprovincial migration, which is a decrease of approximately 2,400 net interprovincial migrants from last year (July 1, 2008). The interprovincial gain in this quarter was primarily attributed to the net inflow of migrants from Ontario (3,653) and Quebec (869). Alberta also had a net loss of interprovincial migrants to British Columbia (-930), Newfoundland (-50), and Saskatchewan (-31).

Alberta's international migration remained strong in this quarter with a net inflow of 6,089 international migrants. This number remains consistent with the second quarter of 2008. There were fewer net non-permanent residents (2,594) in the second quarter of 2009 than in previous quarters (see Table 4). When compared to last year (July 1, 2008), this represents a decrease of more than 4,600 non-permanent residents.

Natural Increase

In the second quarter of 2009, Alberta posted a natural increase (births minus deaths) of 8,046 people. The province experienced 13,361 births and 5,315 deaths. This natural increase is slightly higher than that of the second quarter of 2008 (7,752).
