

Population Estimates

As of October 1, 2011, Alberta's population was estimated to be 3,798,791, an increase of 63,724 persons from the year before (**Table 1**). For the years ending October 1, Alberta's population growth rate jumped to 1.71% in 2011, up from 1.36% the previous year. This marks the first time since October 1, 2009 that Alberta's year-on-year population growth has been the highest in Canada. In the third quarter of 2011 Alberta's population increased by 0.51%, adding 19,438 persons. Only Yukon (0.65%) and Saskatchewan (0.53%) had higher quarterly growth rates.

The national population increased by 1.02%, adding over 350,000 persons from a year ago (**Table 1**). Among the provinces, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba had the highest growth rates, with 1.71%, 1.45% and 1.27% respectively (**Table 3**). Only the Northwest Territories lost population relative to a year ago (-0.73%), but both Nova Scotia and Newfoundland and Labrador experienced minimal population growth.

Migration

Migration from all sources accounted for about 55% of the province's quarterly population growth. During the third quarter of 2011 (July to September), Alberta gained 3,136 persons in interprovincial migration (**Table 2**), compared to 1,155 last year, and a 2009 third quarter loss of over 2,000 (**Table 5**). In addition to Alberta, five other provinces/territories saw a net inflow of interprovincial migrants. However, Alberta's gain was roughly twice the net migration of these jurisdictions taken together (**Table 4**). Manitoba saw the largest net outflow of 1,473, followed by Nova Scotia (-780), New Brunswick (-779) and BC (-723).

Ontario contributed the most (1,006) to Alberta's net interprovincial gain (**Table 4**), followed by Manitoba (477), Nova Scotia (416) and BC (409). Alberta gained residents from every region except Yukon (-34) and Saskatchewan, with whom the net exchange was zero.

Net international migration was an important source of growth in the third quarter of 2011, contributing 0.20% of the recorded growth in the provincial population. The 8,619 permanent residents who settled in Alberta from July to September was a 9% drop from a year ago (**Table 5**). Even so, it was the third highest quarterly level over the past four decades. After becoming positive last quarter, the number of non-permanent residents (NPRs) moving to Alberta continued to exceed those leaving the province, leading to a strengthening net inflow of 2,295 NPRs. As a result, a total of 7,580 net international migrants, including NPRs, moved to Alberta during the third quarter of 2011 (**Table 2**). This was the highest third quarter net international

migration since 2008, and a significant turnaround from the lows of 2010.

Natural Increase

Natural increase continues to be a significant driver of population growth for Alberta. Between July 1 and September 30 of 2011, it contributed 8,722 persons to Alberta's population, the result of 14,237 births and only 5,515 deaths. Over the quarter, the provincial population grew by 0.23% due to natural increase, the highest rate of all the provinces, and almost twice the national average rate of 0.13%.
